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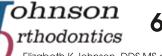
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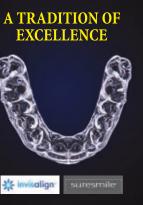

Making Sense of the Present through Conversations about the Past: The HistorySpeaks Series from the Upper Arlington Historical Society

School closings. Church meetings cancelled. Social distancing encouraged. Similar to COVID-19 in 2020, the Spanish Flu of 1918 forced residents of greater Columbus and beyond to wage battle against an unseen enemy by altering their daily life.

It's no wonder that advertisements in the late 1910s used phrases like "pure air," "park-like" and "does not suffer from smoke and dirt" to sell homes in Upper Arlington. Living through our own pandemic, it's easy to understand how those words would have resonated with inhabitants of the congested city at the time. Our young community's restrictions to ensure plentiful shared green spaces and generous private lawns were a powerful promotion tool.

The flu pandemic officially ended in 1920, and Upper Arlington's population continued to grow rapidly. We can find both hope in the eventual return to normal life by our predecessors a century ago and a greater appreciation as to why our community flourished during those early years.

The stories of our history become more robust, more fathomable, when we have a better grasp on the environment within which they occurred. To that end, the Upper Arlington Historical Society has recently launched a new series entitled HistorySpeaks. As the name suggests, this is an opportunity for residents of UA and beyond to gather and learn about topics, providing context and insight from a historical perspective.

Like the coronavirus, issues that are relevant in our lives today often have parallels or roots within our history. For example, Upper Arlington's city officials, school district and community-at-large have recently increased the focus on the areas of diversity, equity and inclusion.

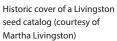
In support of these efforts, the Upper Arlington Historical Society hosted esteemed author Richard

Rothstein at Jones Middle School for their inaugural HistorySpeaks event on March 4. Over 220 people heard Mr. Rothstein discuss themes from his recent book The Color of Law. His extensive research demonstrates how American governments in the 20th century intentionally imposed residential racial segregation across the nation. The presentation and subsequent Q&A session brought an awareness of how institutions played a role in decisions we may have reflexively attributed to individual biases. As one participant reflected, "Mr. Rothstein was an insightful speaker, and I can tell you that I learned a great deal which I will share with others." The Society videotaped the event to share online at a future date.

The next event – June 10 at 2 p.m. – highlights the resurgence of interest in gardening, with a member of the Livingston family detailing the history of the Livingston Seed Company, established in 1850, and its connections to Upper Arlington. Founder Alexander Livingston fine-tuned the tomato into the fruit we know and love today. The event will be held at the historic Miller Ice House, an original Miller Farm structure from the 1800s, on the grounds of First Community Village. The presentation will include historical information on the Miller family and a healthy helping of ice cream sundaes. More information can be found at uahistory.org.

The three remaining programs for the HistorySpeaks 2020 series offer topics to appeal to a variety of audiences. In September, a walking tour will solve the mystery as to why today's real estate ads still promote a "Royce-built home." A Society representative will describe the life and career of 1939 OSU graduate architect Robert R. Royce, and participants will take a short walk to view a few examples of the homes he designed in UA.

The last of the 2020 series will be hosted in late fall in conjunction with the Centennial Veterans Committee in support of the UA Veterans Plaza project. Living historians will roam the Mallway, reenacting the lives of soldiers from the era of the 1916 Camp Willis military training camp that was located there. Attendees will also learn more about the new Veterans Plaza to be constructed in Mallway Park and participate in a ceremonial event.

As a non-profit, the Upper Arlington Historical Society will use the funds raised from these HistorySpeaks programs to continue their work as chief stewards of UA's history and help us all to discover, preserve and celebrate our heritage.

Meet Anthony Trimpe, Owner of Rah-Rah

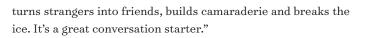

The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center – What is a Comprehensive Cancer Center and Why Does it Matter?

THE OHIO STATE UNIVERSITY COMPREHENSIVE CANCER CENTER

Patients with cancer who seek topnotch treatment can be confident they'll find it at a comprehensive cancer center.

Only 51 institutions in the United States hold a comprehensive cancer center designation from the National Cancer Institute (NCI), and each of these centers must maintain this distinction via a five-year NCI review. Fundamentally it's an assessment,

an opportunity for the NCI to grade the centers in their efforts to provide optimum research-based cancer treatment and prevention strategies.

Expert oncologist and researcher Peter Shields, MD, deputy director of The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center, paints a picture of the NCI evaluation that's more qualitative than you might think.

"It's really about stories," Shields says. "They're not just evaluating the science per se, but that you have a vision to develop the science that leads to an impact."

By "impact," Shields means a new drug, a new public policy, a new screening protocol or a new treatment method. It's anything that's measurable, anything that translates laboratory findings into improvement in the way cancer is understood, prevented, diagnosed, treated and cured.

The Ohio State University Comprehensive Cancer Center - James Cancer Hospital and Solove Research Institute (OSUCCC - James). is among the foremost cancer centers in the nation and is the only NCI-designated Comprehensive Cancer Center in central and southern Ohio. Accompanying that designation are a multimillion dollar NCI support grant and invaluable prestige.

"The NCI wants (Ohio State) to support cancer research with vision, break down traditional university

research silos, support the best science and show that we are making advances in the war against cancer," Shields says. "Our vision at the OSUCCC - James is to create a cancer-free world." A comprehensive cancer center designation requires talented leadership, vast resources and a mass of research in basic, clinical and population sciences. It also requires transdisciplinary approaches so that physicians and scientists can collaboratively craft optimal treatments. Ohio State's cancer program first checked all of the NCI's boxes in 1976 when the university assumed the mantle of comprehensive cancer center. It also has checked them at each subsequent five-year interval. Remarkably, the OSUCCC – James in its two most recent evaluations earned the NCI's highest rating of "exceptional," achieving a perfect score in 2015. How does a comprehensive cancer center achieve an "exceptional" rating or a perfect score? By never settling. "Anyone can have great clinicians," Shields says. "But (many others) aren't

super-specialists. They aren't getting into a room and saving, 'I've got this patient with this tumor that has an unusual mutation.' Then a scientist can step up and say, 'I'm studying that, maybe (the patient) can try this drug.' That's what happens here. It's a translational impact."

Shields says researchers and physicians at the OSUCCC – James work together to provide a comprehensive service to their patients.

He adds that the institution plans to invest more resources into genetics research, targeted therapies, cancer prevention, genetic counseling, cellular engineering and immunotherapycontinuing to foster the collaborative environment that has placed the OSUCCC - James among the nation's best comprehensive cancer centers.

became licensed in acupuncture in 2005 and obtained a second master's degree in Chinese Herbology from the Maryland University of Integrative Health. In 2011, the Ohio State Medical Board recognized this degree, allowing Dr. Pinkham to begin practicing that type of medicine in Ohio. Currently, she is completing a Doctorate of Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine through the Pacific College of Oriental Medicine.

Dr. Pinkham was born into medicine and followed in the footsteps of her MD mother, Dr. Sandra Pinkham, who was a pioneer in alternative, holistic, and integrative medicines. The two doctors were in private practice together for 18 years before she passed away just last year. "The neat thing was we got to collaborate and bridge that Eastern/Western medicine best-of-bothworlds approach as far as her helping people get off medications and maybe using acupuncture or herbs for pain, anxiety, cancer, chronic diseases, autoimmune disorders, fertility, things like that," Dr. Pinkham said.

Integrative Medicine encompasses its patients' full body, mind, and spirit using nutritional supplements and treatments including herbal therapy, acupuncture, and massage therapy. Recently, Dr. Erik Hensel joined forces with Dr. Pinkham to also offer Pinkham Medical patients the use of functional medicine. And, although they are not affiliated with the same company, two chiropractors operate out of the building at Pinkham Medical, truly offering patients an entire wellness clinic under one roof.

"The majority of people coming in for acupuncture, Chinese herbs and nutritional supplements, and functional medicine are not getting relief from their primary care and traditional care, and they're seeking an alternative," said Dr. Pinkham. "Maybe they don't feel well or feel like themselves, and they're trying to find ways to improve anti-aging, to eat better, to feel better, have more energy, to sleep better, to relieve pain, or to focus on recovery. I think normally people come in for pain, sciatica, shoulder, knee, hip, or foot pain, carpal tunnel, and headaches, but you also get a second invisible benefit because it's a relaxation technique, so it helps our body to heal and recover."

Pinkham Medical treats a lot of athletes and individuals with chronic diseases or difficult conditions who are trying to maintain and improve their health. "Anyone benefits from this type of medicine because we live in a stressful world, so just for the stress relief and relaxation alone, it is restorative and rejuvenating and really important."

CAPSTONE CAPS OFF SENIOR YEAR

As the Class of 2020 prepares to graduate and go their separate ways, it is a time to reflect on the past four years and the many achievements of these uniquely accomplished students. While the paths to attaining their high school diplomas varied, most share the common experience of the Senior Capstone project.

Upper Arlington Living met with UAHS Principal Andrew Theado to learn more about the process, the latest improvements and the reasons behind this assignment.

UAL: What is the purpose of the **Senior Capstone project?**

Mr. Theado: Capstone literally means crowning achievement. During their last year at UAHS, we want our seniors to explore a subject they are passionate about and to use the experience as an influencing factor in what they choose to pursue post-graduation. Learning how to independently conduct research and create an end-product are also extremely valuable skills.

UAL: Do all students do this, and what must they accomplish?

Mr. Theado: In order to graduate, Upper Arlington Schools requires the completion of a Capstone project for the majority of seniors. Exempt are International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma candidates who produce an Extended Essay, or lengthy research paper, and those in Community School who participate in the Odyssey Project, an experiential learning program.

Students fulfill three end-objectives to earn their graduation credit: 1.)

writing a research paper; 2) creating a product; and, 3.) presenting their learnings and fielding questions for 10-15 minutes in front of classmates, staff and guests.

UAL: How specifically does the process work today?

Mr. Theado: Seniors must take a semester-long Capstone course which provides dedicated time during the school day and direct access to an instructor. This has also been offered in the summer prior to senior year so students can choose whatever timing - summer, fall or spring - that works best with their own academic and extracurricular responsibilities.

The class operates as a workshop with the teacher providing support to narrow topic ideas, discuss research methods and demonstrate effective presentation skills.

UAL: This is a significant change since some of our readers were seniors, and major alterations were instituted just in the past few years. Can you describe the evolution?

Mr. Theado: Some may remember the Senior Thesis, which was a writing project based in Language Arts and focused exclusively on literature. About 12 years ago based on student feedback, we expanded this process to allow for research on any topic of interest to the student.

The assignment remained under the senior Language Arts course, but the scope became so broad that it began to take prized time away from the overall Language Arts curriculum. It was obvious that a new



process was needed to adequately support our students.

For two years, seniors completed a moderated selfstudy version of the Capstone until we recently implemented the Capstone class requirement.

UAL: What are some examples of **Capstone "products?"**

Mr. Theado: A popular choice is to coordinate a fundraising event for a service organization, like a run to raise money for a youth sports club that lacks resources. Many students also build a portfolio of work - art, writing, music - that centers on a theme, such as using the medium for therapy.

As for a specific example, recently a UAHS hockey player arranged for stuffed bears to be thrown by spectators onto the ice after Upper Arlington's first goal. These furry friends were then donated to Nationwide Children's Hospital.

UAL: Do other local high schools have a similar graduation requirement?

Mr. Theado: Some have senior projects, but our process - research, product and presentation - is unique.

UAL: What are the future challenges with Capstone?

Mr. Theado: We are continually assessing the Capstone process to ensure it is working for our students. Through gathering feedback from our Capstone teachers and our seniors, we are constantly identifying issues and making incremental adjustments.

Looking forward, we want to explore the possibility of incorporating internships into the process to have students connect with the real world in a real way before their high school graduation.

On May 12, 1970, City Council approved an ordinance stating th "a Recreation Department be established, and that the funds be appropriated to hire a Recreation Director and the necessary personnel needed to effectively operate a full-time Recreation Department." (City of UA Council Meeting report, May 25, 1970.)

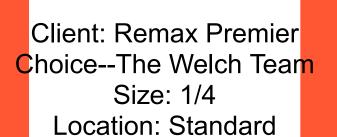

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"On Board THE CHARCU ΤE

Did you read the title of this article and ask yourself, "What Once you have your delectable ingredients chosen, decide how is charcuterie?!" This French term, though hard to pronounce you want to assemble them. Begin with your cheeses and small ("shar-cu-tuh-ree"), refers to an assortment of meats paired with bowls of various canapés, arranging the rolled-up meats around different accompaniments, such as crackers, fruit, cheeses, and them. Nuts and Seeds: Go big or go home! Marcona almonds, spicy nut/seed mixes, caramelized nuts, and even chocolate-covered nuts or raisins are great choices.

Fruits/Veggies: Mix in a colorful assortment of (preferably in-season) fresh and dried fruit, such as grapes, berries, sliced apples, dried apricots, dates, and figs, as well as herbs like basil, rosemary, or thyme. Olives and other pickled or cured vegetables delightfully complement cured meats and provide beautiful color to the board.

Sauces, Breads, and Other Accompaniments: Add a few spreads, jams, and mustards; honey and olive oil with balsamic vinegar work well here too. Go for artisan breads, a toasted baguette, and gourmet crackers with different shapes, textures, and flavors to keep things exciting.

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KISS CHRONIC AND RECURRING INJURIES GOOD-BYE

In our society we tend to look at pain with tunnel vision. If my pain is in my knee, it must be a knee problem. More forward thinking practioner may also consider the hip or the ankle, however that slight broadened perspective still only considers the muscular connection. It does not consider the fascial connection which is much further reaching. Fascia is deeply integral in movement efficiency and the establishment of movement cheats or compensation patterns.

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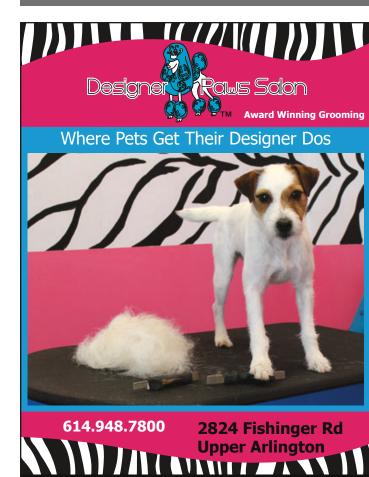

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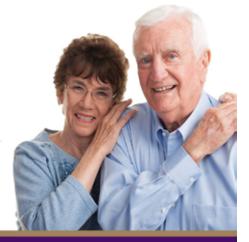


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
